

RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Bird watching Bicycling Fishing
Hiking Hunting Camping

Conservation Areas are closed from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. except for authorized camping, fishing and hunting activities.

- Bicycling is allowed on service roads and roads open to vehicles.
- Hiking is permitted on interior roads and trails.
- Primitive camping is permitted in designated campsite only.
- Campers are limited to 14 consecutive days in a 30-day period. Groups of 10 or more campers need a special-use permit.
- Motor vehicles are allowed on public roadways and in parking areas.
- Nuts, berries, fruits, mushrooms and wild greens may be taken for personal use. Cutting or removing other vegetation is prohibited.
- Dogs must be leashed when not used for training or hunting.
- Special-use permits are required for field and retriever trials.
- No target shooting.

Fishing and Boating

Fishing and frogging are allowed under statewide regulations with the following exceptions:

- Fish may be taken only by pole and line and not more than 3 poles may be used by any person.
- Daily limit is 6 black bass and 4 channel catfish and 30 crappie. Total number of all other fish may not exceed 20.
- All bluegill less than eight inches must be released immediately after being caught. Daily limit will be 10.
- Bullfrogs and green frogs may not be taken with firearms.
- Seining or trapping live bait, including tadpoles, is prohibited.
- Salvage seining of non-game fish for personal use is permitted only with written authorization.

- Boats may be used only for fishing and wildlife activities and may not be left unattended overnight.
- Only electric motors are permitted.

Hunting and Trapping

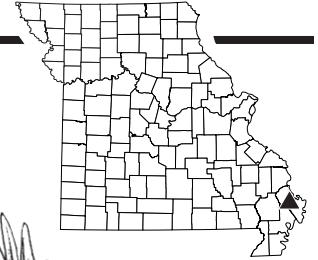
Hunting is allowed under statewide regulations with the following exceptions:

- Deer hunting is permitted under statewide seasons and limits except: only antlered deer may be taken. The area is closed to firearms deer hunting during the urban and antlerless portions of the firearms deer season. Archery antlerless permits may not be used on the area.
- Quail may be taken from Nov. 1 through Jan. 15, and only until 1 p.m. daily.
- Portable tree stands may be used between Sept. 1 and Jan. 31. Stands must be identified with the name and address, or conservation number, of the user. Screw-in steps or other materials that would damage the tree are prohibited.
- Decoys and portable blinds are permitted but must be removed from the area daily. Blinds may be constructed on-site, but only from willows and non-woody vegetation.
- Furbearer trapping is permitted by special-use permit.
